How's Your Heart Today?

I'm reminded of the importance of **guarding** our hearts. As **Proverbs 4:23** states, "Above all else, guard your heart, for everything you do flows from it."

What is the most valuable thing in your home? What would happen if it was stolen or even lost? You probably could replace it using your insurance or savings, which is a hassle to be sure, but not a total disaster either. The truth of the matter is, if a thief broke into your home and stole **EVERYTHING** of value, he still wouldn't have taken the most valuable thing, your most precious treasure—your heart.

In face, the only way a heart can be stolen is if we have attached it to someone or something else that can steal it. Then our loss would be truly great. God tells us to love Him with our entire hearts, because it is <u>in</u> <u>Him alone</u> that our heart can be kept safe. That is so important to realize as our hearts have the power to influence everything else in our lives.

The verse that tells us to guard our hearts also paints a picture of the heart being like a "well spring." A wellspring is a source of clean, fresh, safe water that nourishes the life of the plants and animals surrounding it. It certainly influences everything around it. If it is contaminated somehow, or if it is cut off from its source deep within the earth, everything in the area is affected—which says to me, a wellspring is worth guarding and caring for, protecting from pollution, and maintaining its connection to the source.

So having said all that, let's do a little application here. We are to guard our hearts as if they are providing life-giving springs of water to our lives.

- We guard them from being poisoned by pollution when we keep them from bitterness, hatred, envy, from being offended.
- We guard them from drought by staying connected to the true source through prayer and praise.
- We guard them from unhealthy affections by not attaching them to unreliable things of the world that can steal our hearts away.

God will keep us safe and flourishing as we diligently "guard our hearts" by loving the Lord our God with all of our hearts and our souls and with all our minds, as Jesus commanded (Matthew 22:37).

Prayer: "God, show me how to give my whole heart to You and to guard it well. I know it is safest when it's in Your care."

How's your heart today? In these unprecedented times, it's vital that we protect the wellspring—our hearts. Let's worship the Lord, praise His name, thank Him for His protection, provision, and presence in our lives!

I close by sharing a few lyrics from a song by Hillsong, "From the Inside Out."

"My heart and my soul, I give You control. Consume me from the **inside out**, Lord. Let justice and praise become my embrace to love You from the **inside out.**"

Then, the parking lot when they first drive onto our property and then when they walk in our front door. God created us to be physical beings! So, what we see, smell, and feel directly impacts our impression of a community and whether we want to become a part of it.

As we try to live out the great commission (Matthew 28), we want to love well people who don't have a church home. And while that includes personal hospitality, it also consists of the aesthetic and maintenance hospitality of our website, parking lot, and building.

So, in a way, it is exciting. We just have to see it with new eyes.

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD

May 2024

I'm a person intrigued when I see numbers about a project.

A recent South Central OCC meeting gave me lots of numbers to review and be amazed at how powerful OCC is spreading the love and word of Jesus. Below are some of the numbers.

In 2023 11.3 million shoeboxes were collected, 10 million from the US

118,000 outreach events tools took place (Distribution of the boxes and beginning lessons from the Greatest Journey.)

Outreach events occurred in 100 different countries and 11 continents.

South Central Wisconsin collected 10,278 boxes

2243 boxes were collected at Zion drop off center 60 boxes packed by Zion.

A mind boggling number is for every box packed, besides the child another 7-10 people hear about Jesus and the chance for salvation. Many coming to accept the Lord as Savior. These 7-10 people go out and tell their friends and neighbors. This is how churches and faith communities are being built.

The question was asked haven't we filled enough boxes? The answer was no . By 2028 the goal is to reach 100,000 unreached places. These are places where they have never heard about Jesus. Many of these places are in the Pacific Islands. We still have plenty of work to do.

Want to become a fisherman of souls for Jesus, keep supporting OCC. For May/June we will collect hygiene items- toothbrushes, soap, washcloths, nail clippers, nail files, deodorant. As usual all other items are accepted.
